SMOOTH DANCERS' SILVER ANNIVERSARY

Celebrating a Quarter Century of Dancing Pleasure by Thriving California Group BY VICTOR ZELLER

One Sunday evening back in the year 1937 a group of contest dancers, all staunch partisans of "smooth" dancing, were gathered around the bandstand of the ballroom on Lick Pier in Santa Monica. They were watching the distressing spectacle of contest prizes being handed out, one after another, to the jitterbug maniacs. This was not unusual for the period. Jitterbug had hit the country like a plague. With each gyration its free-swinging exponents seemed to fill an entire ballroom with a madness that seemed weirdly heathen.

But there were a few who remained immune to the craze and who felt that something should be done to preserve the institution of real dancing. This year we are celebrating the Silver Anniversary of the organization which was created in that antijitterbug mood, and readers of Ballroom Dance Magazine are invited to reminisce a bit with me about the quarter century of pleasure which the National Smooth Dancers have brought to many lovers of the best in halfroom dancing.

It was Glenn Helper who first suggested, to Archie McKenzie, the idea of organizing a club for "smooth dancers. The notion caught on fast, and in a few weeks some 40 of the best dancers in the Los Angeles area had signed up. On that original roster were, in addition to Helper and McKenzie, such names as Horance Dunn, Oliver Tucker, Bill Barrell, Walt Reynolds, Charles Provin, Tommy Young, Larry Hartzell, Rudy Martin and Jack Jackson — all gentlemen, if you will notice. (It was not until 1939 that the ladies were admitted as official members, and by 1942 they were allowed to hold the offices of secretary and treasurer.)

When the first by-laws were drawn up, eligibility for membership was somewhat rigid. An applicant had to have won at least three major contests, had to be an American citizen, had to have a reputation for integrity in his own dealings and the proper respect for dancing partners, had to own (or be willing to purchase) a tuxedo and a white suit and, of course, had to be an advocate of smooth dancing. Two formal dances a year, were then on the calendar. These were staged at the Jonathan Club, the Riverside Country Club and the Los Angeles Breakfast Club. Dues in those days were 15 cents a month, with an initation fee of 25 cents. Membership was limited to one hundred, and the result was a constant waiting list.

During the war years of gasoline short-(Continued on page 24)

ages, blackouts and other difficulties, activities of the NSD were necessarily curtailed. All treasury funds at the time were utilized to purchase gifts for members in service camps and hospitals.

After V-J Day, in October of 1945, a gala revival took place. The club was reorganized by Oliver Tucker and Jack Jackson, who summoned together as many champions of the "smooth" cause as could be located. In short order the club was again going strong. That was the year my wife and I joined. We have been members now for 17 years - and have loved every year of it.

In 1947 came the next major step forward, which was incorporation, and on that task Virginia Crawford, Ruth Tucker and Vernadeen Buck spent many hours of work. In November of that year the State of California recognized the organization under its official title, the National Smooth Dancers, Inc. Support for club principles now began to come from territory well beyond the confines of Greater Los Angeles. Today we have 11 chapters: in Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco, Fresno, San Jose, Fallbrook, Oakland, Lakewood, Santa Monica, Visalia, and a new chapter in the San Fernando Valley.

Membership is now approximately one

thousand. As a result of its activities the NSD has been able to contribute funds and gifts to numerous charities and causes, Memhers of the chapters are always looking forward to the next "Dance of the Month," as well as to the state-wide gatherings. Most important of these, of course, is the yearly convention held on the Labor Day week-end.

We feel that one of the most effective showcases for good dancing have been the regular contests and the work of the precision dance groups within the several chapters. Our members regularly "bring down the house" when they demonstrate in ballrooms or on TV.

In 1950 our own little monthly publication. Dance Whispers, was begun. Material is contributed by all club branches, and thus all Smooth Dancers are kept posted about events past and precent and about ideas for further promotion of better dancing.

We are always looking to the future. It has long been the vision of many to break out beyond the borders of California and establish a nation-wide club. Since its reorganization and incorporation in 1947 the NSD has forged shead and has become the best known group of its kind in the country. The success so far has proved that we have the right foundation. the right ideals and the right people behind them. The future is without boundaries!

Lawrence Welk, an honorary member of the NSD, has said that in his travels throughout the United States he has seen no better dancers than ours. An especially hopeful omen for the days ahead is seen in the fact that so many of the younger generation have expressed a desire "to learn to dance as the Smooth Dancers do." Happily, Rock 'n' Roll has not infected all our young people.

The National Smooth Dancers are proud to have been able to show the rest of the world how much fun it is to be able to dance well and how much dancing accomplishes for those who want to acquire valued friends and a more worth-while social existence.

this year's accomplishments are George Reed, Editor of Dance Whispers: Bill Smith, Convention Chairman; Hal Dodds, Publicity Chairman; and, of course, the 1962 President, Ray Bradford.

President Bradford assures us that the 25th Anniversary Convention will be fabulous. The new Crystal Ballroom in the Thunderbird International Hotel is reported to be "the most beautiful ballroom to be constructed in Southern California in the past 20 years," With meetings, parties, contests and five full dance sessions, most Silver Anniversary conventioneers anticipate only a few hours' sleep during the gala 4-day schedule.

Finally, Mr. Bradley adds. "You'll find friendly hospitality, good dancing and plenty of fun from August 31 through September 3 with the Smooth Duncers at El Segundo in Sunny California!"

Palomar's Penny Elliott -Essential Worker



My exact title is City Letter Carrier, I've been working for the Oceanside Post Office my entire career, which began in 1994. That's a mere 26 years! My Route's name is City Route 54-455. We don't call our routes by their "full names" though, usually just the last 2 numbers: rt. 55. I've been on THIS route about 15 years.

What I think about most when considered an essential service is that "YES! I am!" I do provide a service other than "just delivering the mail", I also am aware of my customers and am sometimes the ONLY person they have any contact with on some days. I feel like I provide a sense of normalcy and routine to my customers as well, as they have an idea

of about what time I get there and they appreciate the consistency. I have recently had people, customers and not, come out and thank me for continuing to work, for staying positive, and providing a feeling of community. I've received a few thank you notes and many bottles of water with words of thanks always! It makes me feel appreciated – like they look forward to my making my rounds, even if all I have for them are ads or bills. I've noticed more letter writing, which is wonderful, because it is a more heartfelt, personal and permanent way of communicating, not just via email or a phone call that is gone once you hang up. I love to see kids writing letters to friends or grandparents and vice versa. Letter writing is an art that is being lost to technology.

The largest challenge I have been facing is the number of parcels! It has been busier than Christmas! I have been working some crazy hours due to all the online shopping, I almost find it hard to believe we are experiencing a financial crunch with all the online buying. It was weird to get used to many of my businesses being closed, as about half of my route is commercial. It was kind of scary too. So, I am really thrilled to see businesses opening up more and maybe our world getting back to a more normal way of operating. The biggest complaint I have is that I truly detest wearing a mask, it is very hard to breathe and I feel suffocated and claustrophobic a bit, and I can't keep my glasses from fogging, but I suppose I really can't complain too much, at least I am still working.

As far as dancing goes... I hope I haven't forgotten how! AND I seriously hope we don't have to dance with facemasks on!

There is not a whole lot going on insofar as dance since the studio has been closed since the sheltering in place started in March. However, we have adapted and taking various classes on Zoom both together and separately. We continue to enjoy the American Smooth class where we learn the various arm stylings appropriate to Waltz, Tango, and Foxtrot as well as using parts of our body to express those arms. We also take syllabus classes in American Smooth and International Ballroom. We learn the different figures involved in American Style Waltz, Tango, Foxtrot, and Viennese Waltz at the bronze and silver levels as some are involved in taking the medal test which is a proficiency test. In International Ballroom, we go through the "gray book" (Ballroom Technique) for Waltz, Tango, VW, FT, and Quickstep. We take an exercise class that also involve dance movements for both the lower and upper body and how to incorporate them in a succession of figures. There was a sports psychology class that proved very interesting about various ways of understanding ones' self in the process of dancing and dance theories on how to improve peak performance mentally, physically, and spiritually. Oftentimes our teachers will talk about a certain subject such as partnering skills, how to maintain a connection, expression and showmanship, etc. that are good for both social and competitive dancing. Lastly, a new class has started which focuses on social dancing and I think they will be teaching swing, bachata -- fun type of dances to learn how to let the body go and express itself. That's all.

If any of our NSD dancers would like to do some Zoom classes, they are offered by Dance Vision as well as other professional dance teachers throughout the U.S. You mentioned about Hollywood Academy and the kinds of things Joan Robinson is doing to save Yelena's studio -- Zoom dances; presentations by pros, and lessons and dancing. As the weeks have gone by and the threat of the coronavirus is still looming in front of us and the social distancing guidelines have not eased up

It became apparent to our board that the wisest and safest thing for us to do was to postpone the July 24-26 dates to March 26-28 2021. It will still be called the Roaring 2020's with the same schedule. As we learned a couple of weeks ago that Visalia had cancelled the state convention scheduled for Labor Day weekend we all saw the writing on the wall. So here the options for everyone who has registered and paid and has a hotel reservation.




4 x 4 Dance Sudoku


It's our jive dancing Sudoku - fill in the grid with the letters J, I, V, and E, making sure no letter is repeated in every row, every column and within each mini grid.




