HOW WOULD YOU DEFINE A DANCE TROUPE?

Hello, after the SFV dance troupe Ragtime Mischief showcase in Bakersfield, Tom asked me to write something about what it means to be on a dance troupe and perform. At first, we all thought the idea of being in a dance troupe was going to give us a chance to reconnect with our dance friends, and an opportunity to reacquaint ourselves with dance steps we had not used for over a year. We also thought it would help us re-energize ourselves with the most significant reward being fun and entertaining others. But, we all realized quickly that there was much more

Before I go further, let me say that it is an honor, a privilege, and a serious commitment to be a part of a troupe. For me, being a part of a dance troupe is comparable to participating in a select sport because it requires a level of dedication. In this case, you share your talent and love of dance with peers who share the same passion for dance, enthusiasm to learn, and commitment to the team and the performance.

Our SFV dance troupe was successful because members were committed to the performance and had a chance to highlight a part of themselves that others may not have seen before this showcase.

Let me dive a little deeper for you

·How does it differ from chapter/studio dances?

While commitment is the first and foremost to the dance troupes' success, again, we all learned quickly that there was artistry and unison required along with time and a financial commitment.

A dance troupe is different from studio dance in that our chapters or studio dances have a variety of tempos and beats; a dance troupe requires specific styling, creativity, and often synchronized choreography.

•What is the time commitment?

Practices are essential because being on a dance troupe encompasses other styles of dance and music. It focuses on the perfection of a showcase based upon the dance style, music, technique, and unison. This requires practice, practice, and more practice, individually and as a team.

•What expenses are there?

Some of the essential costs include hiring a professional for choreography, teaching the steps and stylizing of the dance, and focusing on the perfection of the routine based on technique and unison.

Other expenses include costumes, accessories, and some oneon-one lessons with a professional.

Of course, the financial commitment will vary for each showcase and per dancer. While each team member wanted the performance experience, we tried keeping costs to a minimum by not always practicing our choreography at a studio or paying a floor fee for practice sessions. Instead, we supported each other by practicing at the homes of our teammates that had a dance floor or open space.

A lot of the costs depend on how the showcase is choreographed, what style of dance being presented, and the technique chosen, plus the number of dancers in the troupe.

SFV decided not to invest time, talents, and finances to perform the Charlie Chaplain Ragtime Mischief showcase only once. They performed again at our studio's Grand Opening.

·What are the benefits of a dance team?

So, yes, there is a time and financial commitment. However, being on a dance team is a wonderful opportunity to continue doing something you love and to develop new skills and strengths that can be used in other genres of your dance life. Teamwork will have a new definition. For example, two of us were injured during practice and had to drop out. But, because we were a united team, the showcase continued, and our dance troupe got the chance to get that serious adrenaline rush that performing brings.

I am hopeful that this information is informative and encourages each of you to join a dance troupe, and especially helpful to the four NSD chapters that will showcase their dance troupes at the NSD 2022 Convention. We look forward to your incredible and exciting performances ...and don't forget to have fun!

I wish for everyone in NSD to continue to do this something we love called dance whether in a dance troupe or studio.



A room block has been made at the conveniently located Marriott Courtyard in Old Town Pasadena at a rate of \$129. The Garibaldina Society is located an easy 15 minute drive away. Visalia Smooth Dancers celebrates 46 years

Visalia Smooth Dancers celebrated its 46th anniversary this month. That's a lot of foxtrot, waltz and tango!

After a previous smooth dancers club, the Mt. Whitney chapter, disbanded in 1971, dance enthusiasts Gino and Phyllis Demillo "could not stand not having a dance club," according to a written account. They reached out to the home office of National Smooth Dancers in Los Angeles about applying for a chapter charter.

The home office said we needed 25 people, club officers, and must meet other requirements:

"Furthermore, members must...be 21 years of age, be able to do basic Waltz/Foxtrot and basic Rumba or Tango, be a citizen of the United States and be of good moral character."

Apparently we qualified, as the charter dance was held Nov. 1, 1975, at the Visalia Veterans Memorial Hall, to the music of the Hill Parnell band. Cost: \$4.00 per ticket, including a special dance show.

The next year, Stella Yocum was crowned the first queen. In 1977, the club booked a charter bus "with bar and food" to attend the San Francisco Convention and a tradition was born.

The Visalia club has hosted state conventions several times and looks forward to doing so again in 2023.

In reaching the 46-year milestone, grateful thanks are due to the generations of volunteers who decorated the dance hall month after month, planned summer luaus and Christmas dances, welcomed new members, and attended all those club meetings. Thank you all.


